

First-Aid Supply List

The following is a suggested list for first-aid kit essentials. There are always more or fewer things you could pack in your personal kit depending on circumstances and room. What you keep in your barn kit may be different than what will fit for traveling. Key components to remember are clean bandage material for lacerations or swollen limbs, topical ointments, and items to help determine vital signs.  - CombiRoll: 16" for hindlimbs, 14" for forelimbs (smaller horses may need only 12")

- Standing Wraps

 - Some come with just the outer wraps and you buy the thick cotton padding separately, while some come as a set. You need both components, so be sure you are buying both. They are sized in 12", 14", and 16", as well, so make sure you buy the size that will best fit your horse's legs. These are machine washable and can be reused as long as the cotton does not become lumpy, which can create pressure points.

- Prescriptions (must be prescribed by a licensed veterinarian after a recent examination):
 - Pain relievers:
 - Banamine (flunixin meglumine): best for colics and soft-tissue injuries; NSAID, <u>https://www.merck-animal-health-</u> usa.com/product/cattle/Banamine-Injectable-Solution/1
 - Bute (phenylbutazone): best for orthopedic pain, laminitis, etc: <u>https://www.drugs.com/pro/phenylbutazone.html</u>
 - Sedatives:
 - Dormosedan Gel: If severely lacerated or panicking, will sedate after 45-60 minutes and remain calm up to an hour; <u>https://www.zoetisus.com/products/horses/dormosedan_gel/ind</u> <u>ex.aspx</u>
 - Antibiotics:
 - Uniprim: broad-spectrum powder; good for minor lacerations or infections; http://animalsafety.neogen.com/en/uniprim
 - Equisul-SDT: liquid antibiotic that covers a broader range of microbes, given every 12 hours by mouth, better for more serious or deeper infections; <u>https://aurorapharmaceutical.com/products/companionanimals/equisul-sdt174/</u>
- Miscellaneous:
 - o Thermometer
 - Stethoscope (Littman are good investments)
 - Bandage scissors
 - Saran wrap or press-n-seal plastic wrap
 - Waterproof container for storage
